## An Heirloom Finds Its Way Home

Several months ago, I received a mysterious research question regarding a silver pitcher found in an attic in Iowa. Mr. Julius Graves, the gentleman in possession of the item, was interested in returning it to someone connected to its history. There is an inscription on the pitcher which reads, "Miss Sophia Finch, Presented by the M. E. Church South, Florence, KY." This was the clue that led him to the City of Florence; they then contacted me at the Local History department at the Boone County Public Library. Mr. Graves had two questions: would family be found locally and how did this item end up in Iowa?

I was familiar with the family name from the early history of Florence. Sophia Finch was born here in 1848 to Adam and Louisa Finch. Her father was one of the earliest citizens of Florence, having moved here from Bourbon County in 1828. The Finch house, built ca. 1840, is the oldest standing home in town.

Sophia never married, so she did not have any direct descendants. However, she did have five siblings and seven half-siblings, so chances were high that a local family member could be located. Sophia moved to Louisville to be trained as a pharmacist in the late 1880s, then began working in Monterey, California. In 1900, Sophia was living in Colorado with her sister, Fanny, Fanny's husband, and their child. She moved with them first to Virginia, then Missouri, where she died in 1929. I have not found any evidence that she ever lived in Iowa.

Sophia's older brother, John Milton Finch married Maggie Grant, whose family ran the large Southern Hotel in Florence. Their daughter, Virginia Finch, married William Goodridge, uniting two families with deep roots in Florence. Virginia and William's daughter, Elizabeth Delle Goodridge, married Roy Nestor. Their daughter, Virginia "Ginny" Nestor married Harold Kohl. She currently lives in the family home in Florence.

This discovery was providence! Ginny Kohl was my favorite teacher through my middle and high school years, is a dear friend and serves with me as a board member of the Boone County Historical Society. She is the great-great niece of Sophia Finch and is now in possession of this recently-discovered family heirloom. The mystery of how the pitcher ended up in Iowa still lingers. Did Sophia's work take her there at some point or was it left by another family member, forgotten in an attic for years? The answer may never be found, but thanks to Mr. Graves' curiosity and kindness, Sophia's pitcher has returned home to Florence and the caring stewardship of Ginny Kohl and her family.
